East Gippsland Timber Milling Project

We would all be aware of the many diverse strengths and talents that can be harnessed within our communities, in big ways and small, good times and bad. One extraordinary regional project is the East Gippsland Timber Milling Project (EGTMP) which resulted from the energy and vision of committed individuals and community groups in the wake of the 2020 bushfires, and has gone on to have profound and lasting effects on landholders and communities right across East Gippsland from Sarsfield to Mallacoota.

The initial idea for the project built on the experience of Ingrid and Mark Biram in Sarsfield, who were able to save their home, tractors and vehicles during the fires and were later lent a portable Lucas Mill to help them replace fencing and cattle yards that had been destroyed.

The Lions Club of Bruthen and the Rotary Fire Aid Group joined forces to kickstart the project, which saw them take mobile mills and equipment to farms to process timber that had fallen during the fires, at no cost to the landholder. This timber, which included Blue Gum, White and Yellow Stringybark, Southern Mahogany and Red, Grey and Apple Box, was then repurposed according to needs identified by the landholder, such as stock yards, fencing and shedding. All waste products from the milling process were mulched for further use, while sawdust was donated for use in horse stables. The project has also developed a replanting scheme to replace lost trees, with landholders given saplings propagated from seeds collected locally by volunteers.

This highly effective and locally-conceived project drew increasing support from various bodies, including other Lions and Rotary Clubs, DEWLP (Department of Environment, Water, Land and Planning; now DEECA, Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action), BRV (Bushfire Recovery Victoria), Forestec (TAFE Gippsland), NRRA (National Recovery and Resilience Agency, now NEMA, National Emergency Management Agency), East Gippsland Community Foundation and the Minderoo Foundation.

EGTMP quickly saw the need to ensure their workers were well-trained operators, and there are now five previously unemployed people who are accredited in Forestry Management and Chainsaw and Lucas Mill operation through their studies at TAFE Gippsland's Forestec campus. Donations by support organisations have enabled the purchase of a third Lucas Mill (with a fourth now on order), as well as support vehicles, trailers, chainsaws and numerous other pieces of equipment which all contribute to higher productivity and effectiveness. All grant monies received go straight into the project and thence the local economy, as members

of the board of management are all volunteers.

The benefits of this project to individuals, communities and the region as a whole are enormous. There have been 105 properties registered with EGTMP, 54 of which have had the required work completed. 1100 logs have been milled, with an estimated retail value of \$2.5 million. \$96,000 of timber, surplus to property owners' needs, has been generously donated to other property owners who do not have trees down.

Not only the practical assistance, but the ongoing personal and community connection, are a critical part of the difficult journey to recovery and of re-establishing reconstruction, productivity and a vision for the future. Project team members have received many expressions of heartfelt thanks from landholders who, having already suffered from years of drought, now faced guite overwhelming odds. The work of the EGTMP, along with neighbours pulling together in many practical ways, saw a host of tangible results 'on the ground'. This in turn freed people up to focus on other essential tasks such as restoring water supplies, bringing in new stock and attending to pasture rehabilitation, as well as tending to their own health and well-being and that of family, friends and community.

One touching and lasting tribute to these times is the construction of a new lectern for the Wairewa Community Hall. This is to be made with salvaged timber of various species donated from each of the fire-damaged properties worked on in the area, with the express intention that present and future generations will be reminded that 'here is a piece of our farm'. As one observer noted, here is an example of 'creating good history out of bad history'.

EGTMP is seeking ongoing funding so that it can continue to assist fire-affected property owners throughout 2024-2025. Committee members are also exploring ways they can extend its operations beyond that period and be ready to deploy its tried and tested machinery and people for any crisis in future years.

My sincere thanks to Bernie Farquhar, Secretary of EGTMP, and Debbie Brient, Project Manager, for providing me with key information and photographs, and huge congratulations to all who have been involved in this game-changing project. Rail Trail Ramblers enjoy their Rest

A chance encounter with a supine stranger has led to new friendships and a greater appreciation of Bruthen from three e-bike enthusiasts.

Lyndon Glover from the Sunshine Coast was spotted having a well-earned rest in the Rotunda after a train trip from Melbourne and riding from Bairnsdale on the railtrail. He was meeting up with his dad Glen and Uncle Bruce who arrived from Omeo soon after. They have both been travelling around Victoria riding the railtrails wherever possible on a 35 day tour.

Over a year Bruce collected 15 e-bikes from hard waste and assembled 3 excellent ones from the parts. It helps that he is an electrical engineer! He is also a Metro train driver who suffered a horrific crash and derailment on a level crossing and needed a year to return to work. To help with his recovery he started riding railtrails to reduce his traumatic memories of railways and trains and give him a gentler introduction to returning to the job he still loves despite the daily challenges.

His brother Glen flew over from New Zealand and they started Bruce's well-planned trip in Upwey, taking the train down to Colac, then riding to Beech Forest, by rail trail, on their first night. Each place denotes an overnight stay. From there to Port Campbell, Childers Cove, and Port Fairy.

They slept in a volcano at Penshurst. Dunkeld, Halls Gap, Ararat, Skipton, Ballarat, Newstead (5/3). North Harcourt, Bendigo, Toobarak, Tallarook. Alexandra, Mansfield, Edi, Yackandandah,





Tallangatta, Shelley, Old Tallangatta, Snowy Creek (Mitta Mitta). Omeo, Bruthen, Marlo.

The trio were planning on staying a night at Nowa Nowa after Marlo, but could not find a suitable overnight charging arrangement for the bikes. This is something they and other places need to address because they are missing out on business and social opportunities.

A Rambler correspondent was happy to offer them another night's accommodation in town. Their stay included a swim under the Rail bridge and out at Ramrod which they absolutely loved. Before setting off to Marlo the group enjoyed a tasty and sustaining breakfast at Tambo Valley Honey.

Bruthen Inn provided delicious dinners on both evenings and on the second occasion we were fortunate enough to be joined by Omeo residents Chris, Ashley and East Gippsland celebrity cocky Flossie. Meeting locals means that visitors and hosts alike take away so many more enriching, even transforming experiences as in Lyndon's interaction with Flossie. Bruthen will always hold a special place in their hearts and Bruce plans to return next February with his regular crew of e-bike affionados.



Fire Safety: Winters Heating Tips from the Burthen Fire Brigade

With the with daylight savings now here and winter on the way, it's a good time to do some of the basic work regarding your house smoke alarm. Remember working smoke alarms save lives.

Check your smoke alarm and remember:

- Test monthly
- Dust annually
- Replace the alarm every ten years



As the cooler weather kicks in, your local Brigade is urging residents to keep themselves safe by checking and maintaining their fireplaces, chimneys, fireboxes and flues. Each year CFA their fireplaces. sees an increase in the number of chimney fires from both fireplaces and wood heaters. Don't think a chimney or flue fire won't happen to you. Over time there can be a build-up of creosote, a black tar-like residue, which is highly flammable and could clog up chimneys. To reduce the risk of fire starting from your fireplace or wood heater you should:

- Use a torch to check for creosote build-up or obstructions.
- Have your chimney professionally cleaned

annually.

- Only burn dry, clean wood.
- Extinguish your fire before going to bed or leaving the house.



Residents with gas heaters should have the heater inspected and serviced every two years to ensure the safety of loved ones from carbon monoxide poisoning or fire.

Cooler weather conditions and the winter months are one of the riskiest times of the year for fires in the home and sadly, most of these fires can be prevented. Chimney fires can quickly turn into house fires so the few minutes spent now could be one of the most important fire safety actions you take this winter.

Fireplaces can also be a fire hazard if fuels are allowed to fall out of the fireplace. A secure guard or fireproof screen should be used at all times. If drying clothes please ensure they are positioned at least one metre away from the heat source and constantly monitored to reduce the chance of ignition. Likewise, for the kiddies, they must be supervised near all types of heating, always ensure there is safe distance between a child and

"As I slid 600 feet down the side of Mt Loch, I did wonder what the heck I'd gotten myself into? Also how on earth do I get back up? Luckily there were strong poa grasses to haul myself up with.

We've all heard of environmental weed management but have you ever wondered what it actually entails. The Rambler caught up with Wiseleigh resident Tosie about her new dream job at 63 years young working for a Contractor undertaking this project for the East Gippsland Catchment Management Authority.

"I tell people I'm getting paid to have an adventure as well as helping the environment," Tosie said. "Every day is different and my first week included high-country camping in minus 2 degrees with howling winds and rain, the precipitous sliding down the side of Mt. Loch to get to the river below and pulling ourselves up again by the native grasses. Two other days involved constant crossings of the Cobungra River but they stuck it out even in such cold and windy conditions. A warm evening in the Mt Hotham pub that night helped bond the team who all share such a strong work ethic and passion for the environment that challenging conditions are tolerated in order to get a good job done.

Another week had us canoeing along the Mitchell River poisoning willows at the Silt Jetties and Glenaladale'.

Tosie's third week saw the tight-knit crew working at a less geographically challenging location - the Eagle Point reserve - pulling out Kikuyu and other invasive species.

Finally, Tosie would just like to urge other older people to "not give up but look outside the box when



searching for another job. If it's possible to align your passions or principles to the job, all the better. Having great crew to work with makes the physical challenges of the work fun and rewarding "



LADYBIRD BESTLES LEND A MAND



One of nature's pest controllers

The Ladybird Beetle, or Lady Beetle, are one of the most recognisable insects seen in gardens, orchards and crops. Their bright colour and spotty appearance are a tell-tale give-away as to who they are. But did you know that they are one of the best bugs we can have looking after our food?

Both the lady beetle adults and their larvae are beneficial predators that eat the bugs that damage our food producing plants. They are one of nature's pest controllers. Ladybird beetles feed on pests such as aphids, leafhoppers, thrips, mites, moth eggs and small insect larvae. Even though they are small, they can eat 75 aphids every day and their larvae also feed on aphids.

It is important that we look after and encourage these pest controllers. There are many species of beneficial bugs taking care of the pests, please let them do their job.

Good vs Bad

Insect pests can cause lots of problems in our crops and home gardens, especially to vegetable gardens and fruit trees (orchards). To

naturally control pests effectively, we need to identify the pests (bad bugs) and their predators (good bugs) so that we can help the good bugs do their job.

Head out into your backyard and take a close look at the plants - especially any fruit trees or vegetables.

Do you see any ladybird beetles? If you do, that might mean there are bad bugs in the garden, have at look at what they are eating.

Count the spots

Ladybird beetles come in a variety of colours and patterns. The next time you find a lady beetle, look closely at the colour and patterns on the shell. Is the shell red, orange, yellow or even pink? Are there lots of dots, or just a few? Are the patterns made of lines instead of dots? Investigate the variety of ladybird beetles by heading to the CSIRO's Ladybirds of Australia website and browse the Gallery: www.ento.csiro.au/biology/ladybirds/



Australia You are standing in it!

We are blessed in Australia by having so many beautiful, iconic furry animals.

It's not only the Koalas and Kangaroos that make this country unique but the possums, which fill most niches of the environment across the country.

Possums range in size from tiny Pigmy Possums not much bigger than your thumb to Bobucks (Mountain Brushtailed Possums) that can weigh several kilos.

All the 27 Australian possums are nocturnal marsupials and are largely dependent on hollows in old trees for nesting sites.

They all spend their lives in trees even though Brushtailed Possums are opportunistic and will nest in roof tops and sheds.

All possums are shy and non-aggressive and are mainly vegetarian, eating leaves, nectar and flowers although some insects and birds' eggs are also consumed as well as fruit.

Some possums have a gliding membrane attached to their arms and legs that allows them to glide for up to 50 m between trees in the dark. Their fluffy tails are used as a rudder for steering and balance.

The most common possums we see or hear in East Gippsland are Brushtails and Ringtails although if you go out on a quiet night you are likely to hear Sugar Gliders which chatter between themselves in family groups.

Other gliding possums present in East Gippsland are the Yellow-bellied Glider which emits a blood curdling cry that can strike fear into the faint hearted and the beautiful Greater Glider which is significantly endangered by loss of habitat from forestry activities. If you are lucky enough to live in the high country in Gippsland you may be able to see the Victorian faunal emblem, the Leadbeater's Possum which is endangered and was only rediscovered in 1961 after being classified as extinct for almost 50 years.
