

Craig Terrill – Metal Artist

Craig Terrill is a fourth generation Tambo Upper resident, his grandfather having gone to Tambo Upper Primary in the early days of the school.

Craig started life as a welder, changed trades and 30 years later returned to welding as an art form, creating large scale outdoor sculptures.

Craig's imagination is colourful and well expressed in a variety of forms: you may have seen his wonderful dragon which he showcased at this year's Bruthen Medieval Festival. His works range from a large-scale spinning wind feature made from recycled fishing cable with rotation lights, to beautiful butterflies and dragonflies using colourful glass beads, all of which light up at night. The dragonfly and a butterfly enhance the entrance to

his property.

Craig is currently working on a large-scale scorpion using sheet metal and rod. Craig doesn't sell his works, they just decorate his extensive garden.

Hopefully you will be able to enjoy his work in the central gardens at the Eat Drink & Explore Festival which, is being held in the Bruthen Village next year on January 27.

New Buildings and Courts for

The implementation of new change and court facilities at the Bruthen Recreation Reserve is a step closer with the signing of contracts for both the build of new changeroom and public amenities facilities and the redevelopment of Tennis and Netball Court surfaces.

Funding was received from Emergency Recovery Victoria (ERV) for redevelopment of court surfaces, building of additional toilets (on the western side), and construction of new change facilities on the eastern side of the ground. Due to budget constraints (basically inflation in the building game) – the western side toilets will be considered at a later stage, when and if more funding becomes available.

Chairperson of the Bruthen Recreation Reserve Committee of Management (BRRCoM) James Nicholas said that the newly elected Committee have been working hard to ensure that the project not only is delivered on budget, but also on time. The project represents key facilities that will serve the community well into the future. The change and administration facilities (that adhere to individual sporting association standards), will see the following built:

- Home and away Netball changerooms and ablutions;
- Home Cricket Club change and ablutions





(doubles as visiting team facilities in the football season)

- Umpire change facilities and compartmented unisex ablutions.
- A dedicated tenant Club (s) administration room.
- · A First Aid room.
- Two unisex toilets and a unisex 'accessible' disabled / parents change room toilet.



The successful contractor for the new change facilities is local firm BuiltQA from Marlo, headed up by Lachlan Heather and Luke Priestley, who are "excited to be the prime contractor involved in the delivery of this key piece of community infrastructure". Importantly the new facilities will also double up to provide important resources for emergency services (as the Recreation Reserve is used as a staging ground); in times of large-scale emergency response.

Cranes Civil and Surfacing are the preferred contractor for the redevelopment of the old Tennis Courts. Cranes have the expertise to rejuvenate the old court surfaces to modern standards. Recent work completed by Cranes include delivery of Netball, Hockey and Soccer surfaces at the newly developed 'World Sports Centre" in Bairnsdale.

The existing courts which have seen better days have been affected by ground movement and wear and tear on the surface. Cranes have been contracted to reinforce current ground works, resurface and extend the courts so that they are match day compliant for both Tennis and Netball Victoria. The new configuration of the court surface will see the three existing tennis courts reduced to two courts, with a hard surface extension which allows placement of a netball court. The middle tennis court will have removeable net poles so that during Netball season, tennis nets can be removed so that the surface can double as a warm up area. The newly resurfaced (with lighting) Netball Court on the western side of the oval will remain for night training and extra matches. This is important due to the growth in netball within Bruthen & District. The retention of two Tennis Courts is also important as these are used regularly by members of the community and visitors to the town.

The Committee of Management wish to advise that while there will be some disruption to activities at the oval from mid-January, this will be minimised as much as possible. Main construction of the building will commence early 2024, with the project to be completed no later than November 2024. The BRRCoM wish to thank Courtney Campbell, Development Solutions Victoria (DSV) for planning and permit advice and Tom Hardy Design for his

technical and contractual work completed to date. Once again both local contractors, with a keen interest in the development of local facilities.







This month's bird is the iconic Australian Wagpie. They're probably best known for their beautiful, warbling song. But there's a lot to admire about these birds, which are curious, intelligent and

charismatic.

A heavy set, black and white bird. In our part of Australia, the nape, upper tail and shoulder of the males is entirely white. Adult female birds have a light grey mottling on their backs as do juveniles up until two years old. Adult birds have a chestnut brown eye.

Australian Magpies are common and found throughout most of Australia wherever there is a combination of trees and adjacent open areas, including parks and playing fields. They're absent only from dense forests and arid deserts. Groups of up to 24 birds live year-round in territories that are actively defended by all group members. Groups depend on their territory for feeding, roosting and nesting requirements. Territories are spaced every 200-300 metres. Group members can remain on the territory for 10-15 years.

Being omnivores, their diet contains insects, worms, small lizards, mice, nuts and seeds and even other bird's eggs and nestlings. You may see them walking along the ground searching for insects, then cocking their heads to the side before striking. This is because they can hear small animals moving under the ground.

Madpies are one of Australia's most highly regarded songbirds. They make a loud, musical flute-like song, often performed as a duet or by groups. They have a wide variety of calls, many of which are complex, with their pitch varying up to four octaves. When alone, they can make a quiet, musical warbling noise. Louder calls are made to announce or defend their territory, raise the alarm for predators, or are begging calls made by juveniles. They can mimic over 35 bird species, as well as other animal calls, such as the barking of dogs. Magpies have been noted to mimic human speech or even the cry of a baby!

Peak breeding season is August to November. Females lay three to five eggs which hatch in around 20 days. Chicks are fed for up to four weeks on the nest and remain in the group for up to two years, after which they join large groups of roaming 'adolescent' and non-breeding magpies until they can gain a place in a territory as an adult breeding bird.

Magpies are generally quite tame, but during the breeding season they can become aggressive towards predators/intruders who venture too close to nesting sites. They're not actively trying to hurt people or pets; they're just protecting their young in the nest, for about six weeks of the year.

If you want to feed them, try turning over some rocks or digging up some dirt for them to forage over

How to make a Pom Pom.

With a pair of sharp scissors slide the blade between the sheets of cardboard and cut the outside making sure you get all the threads. To finish tie off firmly between both pieces of cardboard leaving the ends long for hanging your creation.

Life saving training at **Bruthen Neighbourhood** House

On November 17, a group of fortunate locals participated in a very rewarding hour-long workshop to learn or refresh their basic life-saving skills with CPR and AED (Automated External Defibrillator) Training.

Jamie from Paynesville Ambulance was very knowledgeable and engaging. We were all given heart-shaped aids with squeaker that we had to compress quite forcefully to emit a sound. Unfortunately, this is the pressure needed and sometimes results in broken ribs. But as Jamie pointed out, "Would you rather suffer that or be dead?"

Another point he made was that these days responders are not expected to do mouth-to-mouth resuscitation if they are not comfortable doing so. Of course, family and friends invariably carry out with this procedure but studies have shown CPR success is more reliant on effective chest compressions. These are very important while waiting for an AED and/or ambulance.

There are AEDs located at the Rec Reserve Oval, Bowls Club, Fire Brigade, Neighbourhood House, Police Station and Bruthen General Store.

Remember to always call 000 FIRST.

Can you burn off without a permit? The short answer is NO...... but here is some useful information

What are fire permits? Fire permits are issued to businesses and individuals who need to use fire to conduct work or an activity. They provide an exemption to laws during a period when fire restrictions are in place or a day of Total Fire Ban (TFB) with specific conditions applied.

During the Fire Danger Period

A permit valid for use during the declared Fire Danger Period but not on Total Fire Ban days. Commonly referred to as 'Schedule 13' or 'Schedule 14' permits.

On days of Total Fire Ban

A permit valid for days of Total Fire Ban only. Commonly referred to as 'Section 40' permits.

Can I obtain a permit to do a controlled burn? YES – you can visit the following website

https://firepermits.vic.gov.au/ which takes you to



If granted a permit – you MUST (as a general rule):

- -have a copy of the written permit with you (or a copy on your phone)
- -not leave the burn unattended.
- -have a means of extinguishing the fire.
- -check weather conditions to determine if it is safe to burn.
- -conduct the burn within the time stated on the permit.
- -abide by any conditions stated on the permit.
- -fully extinguish the fire at the conclusion.

So what happens if I do not have a permit or leave the fire unattended? A responding Brigade will turn up, most likely extinguish the fire <u>and call Victoria Police (we have no choice in this)</u>. Police will determine based on facts, whether a charge or fine is warranted. In short – do not put your local Brigade in this position, do not burn without a permit and do not leave a fire unattended. Brigades have no choice but to report unauthorised burns to the Police.. So – we recommend **CHECK** – **APPLY**
