

- 6 July: Lakes Lights: Enchanted Shores, Lakes Entrance Foreshore a mesmerising spectacular of artist-made lantern sculptures, roaming performers, and lighting projections will create a whimsical world on the Lakes Entrance Foreshore, with food trucks and live music.
- 13 July: Water & Lights, Paynesville rug up for a magical night by the water with a lakeside lantern

parade passing lighting installations off the jetties of Paynesville, then settle in for a family-friendly outdoor cinema night and food truck fare!

• 20 July: Deep In The Weeds at Sailors Grave Brewing, Orbost – Sailor's Grave Brewing's infamous 'Deep in the Weeds' festival returns at a new venue in 2024, the Marlo Hotel! Expect punk rock, weird and wonderful beers and a great time.





Did you know?

Frogs are amphibians. The word amphibian comes from the Greek word 'amphibios', which means "to live a double life". This refers to most amphibians having two parts to their life cycle - the first in water during the egg and larva stage and the second on land during the adult stage.

New Local History Journal Is Launched

Bassian Thrush

Bird of the Month - May 2024


Birdlife East Gippsland members recently attended an Autumn camp at Toora. Over the four days, several members were lucky enough to catch a glimpse of the very secretive Bassian Thrush.

About the size of a common blackbird, the plumage of the Bassian Thrush is mottled brown to olivebrown with heavily scalloped black crescent-shaped bars on the back, rump and head. The paler cinnamon-coloured underparts have brown-black scalloping. They have a distinctive white ring around the eye.

Found predominantly around the south-east of Australia, but also in the Atherton Tablelands, farsouth Queensland, Tasmania and Kangaroo Island, their preferred habitat is damp, dense forest and shrubland areas and heavily vegetated gullies which have a thick overhead canopy and leaf-litter below.

Often a solitary bird, but sometimes in pairs or small groups, the Bassian Thrush feeds on the ground, scratching under the leaf-litter to expose moist soil in search of small invertebrates. Bassian Thrush stand still, listening carefully for insect movement in the leaf litter, then rush forward to pounce on them and can often be detected by listening for those rustling sounds as dry surface leaves and twigs are thrown aside.

When disturbed, they may run briefly, before becoming motionless and relying on their mottled brown plumage to blend them into the forest



background. While usually a quiet bird, you may hear their song, like a muted version of the song of the common blackbird, especially at dawn or in dull weather.

Breeding in July to December they build a large, deep, cup-shaped nest made of bark strips, leaves and rootlets, camouflaged outside with green mosses and lichens. Nests can made in a major tree fork, in a depression on top of a stump or a ledge in a cave. This nest can be very low or up to 15 or so metres above the ground. Two or three eggs form the clutch and both parents care for the young.


Mobile Library

Fire Restrictions end in East Gippsland

The Fire Danger Period (FDP) is officially ended in East Gippsland

While restrictions are lifting in the area, CFA still expects the grassfire risk to remain across the state, so you need to remain alert and prepared.

Residents are reminded that Total Fire Ban days may still occur so any fires that are lit must be able to be extinguished immediately.

The end of the Fire Danger Period (FDP) will be an opportunity for some landowners to burn-off again, however it's important that residents check that local conditions are safe before undertaking these activities.

You must register your burn-offs, check weather conditions and follow local council laws, as well as EPA laws and applicable regulations.

Registering your burn-off ensures that if smoke or fire is reported, the incident is cross-checked with our register, firefighters which prevents from unnecessarily responding.

When conducting burn-offs, remain alert and always have resources on hand to extinguish the fire.

Landowners can register their burn-off online at www.firepermits.vic.gov.au or call 1800 668 511.

If possible, landowners should also notify their neighbours and others nearby who may be sensitive to smoke so they can take necessary precautions.

Tips for looking after your health when there is smoke can be found on EPA's website.

Keep your burn off safe and legal:

Check fire restrictions in your area and always register your burn at www.firepermits.vic.gov.au.

Check and monitor weather conditions – particularly

To avoid unnecessary calls to emergency services, notify your neighbours beforehand.

Leave a three-metre fire break, free from flammable materials around the burn.

Have sufficient equipment and water to stop the fire spreading.

Never leave a burn-off unattended - stay for its entire

If your burn-off gets out of control, call '000' immediately. Tips for looking after your health when there is smoke can be found on EPA's website.


Jon is a member of the Bruthen Arts & Events Committee and the local CFA.
