

Second birthday for Tambo Valley Honey

Bruthen's Tambo Valley Honey is testament to a wonderful shared vision, great collaboration with locals and people further afield, a hugely varied skill set and plenty of hard work. As the premises in Main Street approaches its second anniversary some of the Rambler team turned up to find out more from owners Ben and Stacey Murphy and their crew.

It wasn't too much of a surprise to find that Ben was out in the field ... this time in the Mildura region where he had gone to collect some of their bees which had been busy with almond pollination. But Stacey happily obliged us with her reflections on how their business has developed.

In 2018 Ben and Stacey purchased the bees from third generation beekeeper and local, Ian Cane. Ian had been a wonderful mentor to Ben in the years leading into purchasing the business, and still to this day helps to support and guide when they need a listening ear, or a helping hand. They are very thankful to Ian and Robyn Cane for their support, and have a wall dedicated to the Cane family to pay homage to them and the family history as well as a dedication photo to another local legend beekeeper Colin Sells. You can read some of the fascinating history of the Cane family's bee-keeping exploits on the Tambo Valley Honey website.

The Murphys own 1000 beehives, each housing 40,000 to 60,000 bees. (There are 4,000 to 6,000 in the working hive in the store.) The hives are primarily based in East Gippsland, and Ben has a number of licensed bee sites. He will hike through the bush searching out the best stands of native forest, and when the trees flower drives out with the hives to deliver the bees to the feed. But he will also travel further afield, including interstate, to help with pollination services. After all, without bees we would not have those almonds and many other fruits and vegetables.

They created a brand and labels and carefully selected the jars to stand out to complement the distinctive varieties of honey, and began selling wholesale products to a few businesses and restaurants around the area.

The 2019/2020 bushfires hit hard, wiping out a lot of the bush that housed the hives. 200 beehives were lost in these fires.

After the devastation of the bushfires, Stacey feels they were lucky to join in collaboration with other small local businesses – Gippsland Jersey, Seasalt Sourdough and Forge Creek Free Range Eggs putting together breakfast gift boxes for people to sponsor towards those in need.

Out of this also came an application for a bushfire recovery grant.

This was approved and a contribution from the Government helped begin the journey, earlier than expected, for Ben and Stacey to create a space in Bruthen to showcase the importance of bees, promote education about them and collaborate with other local businesses to showcase the region's food sector. And it also promised to create more local job opportunities and bring more people to Bruthen. The couple had a strong vision that their shop would complement a town which already had so much to offer everyone, locals and visitors alike. Ben and Stacey have a young family, and with Ben working long hours caring for the bees and also travelling long distances, the process of bringing their vision to life was at times guite taxing on the family. Stacey says their staff have been fantastic. It was a little unknown how the business would look, but the team, one by one, jumped on board with them and put a lot of faith in what was envisioned: they have been flexible and are always thinking of fresh new things they can all do to bring more to the business.

Tambo Valley Honey employs around 15 local people, on a part time / full time basis, with some casual positions and junior members. One of the things Ben and Stacey are most proud of is that they have been able to provide an opportunity for a chef's apprenticeship for a young local.

Chef Sam Mahlook joined the team around 5 months after opening, bringing to life exactly what the Murphys envisioned the menu and café atmosphere to be. She came with a wealth of knowledge, passion for food and the passion for the local suppliers. She is also a wonderful mentor to Evelyn who is now into her second year apprenticeship.

In store there is a live, working beehive, a gift shop, showcasing other local makers, as well as a free honey tasting table, where visitors and locals can speak to the team about the many varieties of mono floral honeys. There is a stock around 15 flavours of raw honey.

The team harvests and processes all of the honey from the hive, to the extraction shed to the packaging facility.

Mel and Janine hand pour and label the honey, as well as pour the beeswax candles, make furniture polish, lip balms and more.

The business collaborates with Nicholson River Soaps, Bancroft Bay Distillery, Logans Distillery, Sailors Grave Brewing, Exquisite Treats, Chocky Sweet Box, Wildkraft Apothecary, Paynesville Pantry, Cassilis Estate, Big Bears Donuts and more. The Café menu showcases local suppliers and producers such as Gippsland Jersey, Johnsonville Blueberries, Paynesville Pantry and Wyanga Winery and more. Working with the local suppliers and makers is a huge highlight for Stacey: to be able to include them throughout the shop and café is what she and Ben hoped to be able to achieve. And she loves the group bookings, with people of all ages, to chat about bees.

The best three entries will receive a hamper of local products, and 13 photographs will be chosen to

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

Upcoming elections for East Gippsland Shire Council

With the 2024 EGSC elections coming up soon, some names might be pretty familiar to readers as four candidates that we know of so far ... Steven Columbus, Jess John, Aly Nichol and James Nicholas, hail from the Bruthen district. (PS that's just an interesting observation, with names in alphabetical order, not a voting recommendation!)

It's important to note of course that our Shire does not have subdivisions, and the nine councillors who are elected for a four-year term will each represent the whole shire.

Candidate nominations close on September 17, and the complete list of candidates in ballot draw order will be available from the following day, Wednesday 18. Voting for this election will be by postal ballot and is compulsory for all State-enrolled and Council-enrolled voters. Ballot packs will be posted from October 7-10, with the election period ending 6 pm Saturday 26 October.

Hi my name is James Nicholas. I am standing in the upcoming municipal elections for council. I believe that community connected, independent councillors enable local government to best represent residents.

I am a part time Postie, and also work locally as a Disability Support Worker. If elected I can fully commit to being a councillor. I would like to tell you a bit about myself and why I am standing. I hold positions with several community organisations. I am involved in the Citizens Association, hold leadership positions as President of the Bruthen & District Neighbourhood House, Chair the Committee of Management for the Bruthen Recreation Reserve and am Captain of a local Bruthen Fire Brigade. I also assist in RSL community support programs. Skills gained in these organisations; are attributes I can bring as a councillor.

In addition, a decade as owner of the Bruthen General Store provided me with experience in delivering a service - on time and on budget.



Prior to my time in small business, I spent 22 years in the Australian Army in tactical, operational, and strategic appointment's. As an individual who has returned from active service – I am acutely aware of the need for team work in any organisation. I am not deterred by hard work.

The future for our families in Bruthen & District must be centered on a commonsense approach to development and job creation. Without it, local business (including farming) suffers, job creation stalls and opportunity for us as a community, stagnates. There <u>must</u> be a balance between developing Bruthen & District and maintaining the reason why we all chose to live in this gem of a region.

Representative on the Bruthen Main Street redevelopment (which is still being undertaken). I was also responsible (with others) for achieving funding for the establishment Bruthen & District Neighbourhood House that has become a key component of our community fabric. Likewise, I have been involved in ensuring we now have enough water to fight fires to protect out township with placement of key town protection water tanks.

What can I promise if elected? For one a balanced approach to issues. I promise to engage with the whole community, be transparent in my dealings and contribute to effective service performance of the Council. It's about time we had local representation and someone who has fought for the community (as a volunteer) in many community groups over the last 14 years. Let me represent you at the next level. 
Finding Joy and Peace with Donna Davies



Gary Belskyj - Local Sculptor

Gary Belskyj is a local multi-disciplinary artist who is married to Colleen and has two sons. He was born in Ballarat and moved to Adelaide in his early teens. He studied by correspondence at the University of Akron, Ohio and locally at the South Australia Institute of Technology and Swinburne Institute in Melbourne working as a PhysicalTest Technician and later as a Chemical Analyst in organic polymers and plastics in the Automotive Industry. With the industry's demise, Gary changed occupation to move into Mechanical Test and Engineering for a R&D Laboratory in private industry. Later deciding to become a stay at Dad concentrate home and on his artistic endeavours. He has always enjoyed working with his hands so with a keen interest in old trades he learned blacksmithing and has been able to combine his engineering and computer expertise with old trade skills.

Visiting relatives and family in mid north NSW, there was a lot of travelling back and forth from Adelaide over the years, so in the late 1990's with a 5 year plan in mind, the family decided to move. With Gary's brother having relocated to a farm in East Gippsland earlier, an interest in the area grew. Proximity to family, to the sea and snowfields also held significant priority in the plan. After deciding that East Gippsland would be a nice place to settle and selling their historic Adelaide home, they purchased a 10 acre property in Tambo Upper. There was a house on the property to which Gary has made alternations and extensions and landscaped a wonderful garden retaining enough trees to keep the family in wood over the

Gary has always been very involved in the community and his interests and commitment are wide spread. In his early days in TU he volunteered with the Tambo Upper Primary School and joined the CFA, attending various community events as a means to get to know people and the local communities. A keen musician, playing guitar and banjo, in the early 2000's when his two boys attended Tambo Upper Primary school he was prominent in helping run the 'Tambo Jambo' and also the 'Bruthen Blues' where he helped to organise the Saturday street stage and book artists for the Mechanics Hall Music Café event.

He has made mostly large sculptures and I noted some in his garden. If you visit Tambo Winery you will see one which was commissioned there.

Gary has supported, exhibited at and worked on multiple exhibitions over the including locally Nowa Nowa Nudes (where he invented mechanisms for the pupeteers), Bruthen's Mixed Bag (People's Choice prize) and at the Bruthen Food and Wine day last January. His work


has also been seen at the Firkin Exhibition and several East Gippsland Gippsland Art Gallery shows. His particular involvement with 'Float' is the F-lamp exhibition and he is currently preparing for this year's event. The work will have ambience and be decorative as well as serving as a light source. The Big Fish on the foreshore at Lakes needed to be re-made and made 'publicsafe' and the Dolphin Head at Paynesville needed refurbishment from canvas/fibreglass construction to stainless steel and Gary completed both works on behalf of and with financial assistance from the East Gippsland

The Nowa Nowa Penny Farthing bike rack in 2010, the fruit cart for 'Froute' 2014 and the Art Cart for East Gippsland Art Gallery 2015 are all his creations.

Gary is a collector on many levels of old and sometimes quirky things and to try and document his interests is impossible, but it includes collecting 1950's - 60s Sci-Fi/Atompunk movies and paraphernalia, Alternative Universe and fantasy particularly books, of the same 'Steam Punk' is how Gary describes the multitude of sculptures I was fortunate enough to view in his sitting room. Steam Punk is a term I had only vaguely heard of until our interview. It is a retrofuturistic subgenre of science fiction or science fantasy that incorporates technology and aesthetic designs inspired by 19th-century industrial steampowered machinery and expresses Gary's smaller works perfectly. He mentions writers Jules Verne, H G Wells and Phillip Pullman's 'The Amber Spy Glass' as good examples of the style, while explaining his work to me. It's extremely imaginative and kinetic usina recycled, deconstructed antique items - brass/copper/ bronze/ parts of an old piano/ old clock mechanisms/furniture pieces/bakelite/ old gauges/ piping /old mechanisms animated by computerised light and sound coming from perhaps a small, glass screen and a test-tube or two. It's hard to explain but visually awe inspiring. He makes these pieces for his own enjoyment and aims to allow people to focus on art from a totally different perspective. The sitting room is home not only to these amazing

built objects but curiosity cabinets housing for example, a theodolite, a phrenology head, clock making equipment, a 2,000 year old Hittite ring and lots of old scientific equipment. In the future he would like to retro-fit a caravan and take a selection of these amazing works on the road as a travelling show. Exhibiting for education as well as entertainment... a time portal on the move. would be thrilling for the public, I know.

Bruthen's Haven of Wellbeing

The Tambo Rambler recently caught up with Mel at Bruthen's newest drawcard - Wildkraft Apothecary & Natural Medicine Centre.

What a beautiful, inviting showroom Mel has created with mood lighting, a comfortable couch, plants, crystals and jewellery, natural products and her shelves of tinctures and teas. Speaking of teas, Mel makes a different brew every day, to share. The day's tea might include herbs and other things her customers bring in such as the lemon myrtle, rosemary, ginseng and orange on offer the day I was there. One of Mel's motivations is to get people to slow down, make a pot of herbal tea everyday to relax more and be mindful of what is happening to their bodies.

"Something as simple as having a cup of tea a day can provide individualised medicine to support our health."

Mel's customised teas come in 50g bags, all \$18, which provide 30 cups of tea.

Mel believes very strongly that education and healthcare should not be limited by income, but be accessible to everyone. It has become increasingly costly to access alternative and complementary healthcare, which is one reason Mel doesn't increase her prices when suppliers do. A few years ago Private Health Insurance provided a rebate for this kind of healthcare, but it has since been withdrawn. A review and hopeful reinstatement is pending.

Mel wants to support natural immunity through diet, lifestyle and herbal medicine, Terrain Theory. One of her challenges is getting people to understand the differences between natural remedies and allopathic (prescriptive) ones. Nathuropathy helps the body through natural processes which takes time, commitment and accountability. It treats the causes, not the symptoms like Western medicine.

Mel's mission is all about education: indeed. DOCERE ('Doctor as Teacher' in Latin) is the underlying principle behind Naturopathy. To discover why our health is in a state of imbalance and how to prevent it happening again. In other words, to have Sovereignty over our body. She is very non-judgemental and not dogmatic in supporting people's health choices. If they aren't ready to give up alcohol she will provide liver tonic or lung tonic for smokers, as examples.

Mel is available for Naturopathy and Holistic Coaching on Mondays. First consultations


usually last an hour and a half with return ones usually 45 minutes. Tuesdays and Wednesdays offer Shiatsu and traditional Japanese therapies Friday - Naturopathy and coming soon Frequency Healing Reiki Saturdays on Workshops on Sundays at 5pm.

These might include Frequency Healing using the Tesla Theory. The RIFE machine invented by Royal Rife in the early 30s is based on our bodies vibrating at different frequencies while our diseases do also. So the machine helps to calibrate frequencies. the two Breathwork is another workshop used for anxiety and a Crystal Workshop is in the pipeline.

Mel is very approachable so if anyone has an idea or enquiry, she is a font of knowledge and wisdom. There is no pressure to buy. Come in, have a chat, a cup of delicious herbal tea, sit on the comfy couch or in the sunshine and enjoy the enthusiasm and experience Mel has to offer. Maybe, like me, you will marvel at her clear skin, eyes and equilibrium and concede that the wisdom of the ages have given us all the agency we need to lead better, healthier lives.

Eastern Pygmy Possum





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Laughing KookaburraBird of the Month – September 2024

The distinctive laugh of the Laughing Kookaburra is one of the special sounds of the Australian bush. Their chuckling voice is what gives this species its name and is a common and familiar sound throughout East Gippsland. The easily recognisable and loud 'koo-koo-koo-koo-kaa-kaa-kaa' is often sung in a chorus with other individuals and can be an essential feature of any dawn chorus. But the 'laugh' is actually a territorial call, warning other birds to stay away. In favourable conditions, they can live for more than 20 years and are believed to pair for life.

Generally off-white below, faintly barred with dark brown, and brown on the back and wings. The tail is more rufous with broad black bars and they have a conspicuous dark brown eye-stripe through the face, with a long beak and large brown eyes. The brown and white feathers help to blend in with the environment, making it more difficult for prey or predators to see them. They are one of the larger members of the kingfisher family.

Laughing Kookaburras are found in sclerophyll woodlands and forest throughout eastern Australia. They have been introduced to Tasmania, and the extreme south-west of Western Australia. Sometimes found abundant in parks, towns, and campgrounds, where they have been known to take a sausage off the BBQ!

Feeding mostly on insects, worms and crustaceans, although small snakes, mammals, frogs and birds may also be eaten. When prey appears, the Kookaburra dives down and grabs the prey with its strong beak. Large prey items such as lizards and snakes are bashed against rocks or trees to kill and soften them before being swallowed.

Breeding from August to January they create nests in any hole which is big enough to fit an adult, such as a tress hollow or termite mounds built in trees. Both sexes share incubation and caring duties for the clutch of 2 to 3 eggs. They live in families, with siblings remaining in the family till they are old enough to look after themselves. Every bird in the group shares all parenting duties.

To protect the Kookaburra's habitat, retain as many trees as possible around your home. Kookaburras need trees for nesting, roosting and to perch on while waiting for food. Mulching your garden with leaf litter can create a perfect habitat for worms, insects and lizards, which Kookaburras love to feed on.

Our best dressed awards for each classroom were taken out by Luca, Mikayla, Jaxon, Harry and Phoebe. Super effort champs, well done.


Wildflowers of East Gippsland book launch coming soon
