

Summer Fire Preparation - Must Do's

As fire season is almost on us residents **must** implement a few basics to prepare. First and foremost, develop **your** fire plan. While there are many formats you can follow, some guidance can be found on the CFA website – specifically:

https://www.cfa.vic.gov.au/plan-prepare/before-and-during-a-fire/your-bushfire-plan

Shortly you will receive a copy of the township Local Incident Management Plan (LIMP) in the post from the Citizens Association and the Shire. Copies will also be available at local businesses. There is a quick reference guide (trifold) with a magnet. Attach this to your fridge for reference in time of need (but make sure you read it prior to doing so). You will also receive an A5 sized booklet which gives you more detailed information on what to do in the event of an emergency (fire, flood, storm etcetera). This booklet provides good examples of what to do and is tailored to Bruthen and District. Part of preparing for fire season is considering the guidance provided in the plan. So, reading at the last moment when you smell or see smoke, it's just too late. It is your responsibility to be prepared.

Part of summer preparation is ensuring the hydrant point (which provides us with reticulated water to fight a house or bush fire is maintained).

Hydrant points around Bruthen are located using markers. These could include:

- A marker post, (angled red top band), and usually a blue coloured disk is also found attached.
- A blue reflector close to the middle of a road; across from the reflector a hydrant point should be found.
- A blue (sometimes white) hydrant cap (the effect of weather and corrosion may discolour), found in grassed nature strips.

While the Bruthen Fire Brigade inspects and tests hydrant points, **We Need Your Help** to keep these operational and visible. Hydrant points should be easy to be seen; but with the advent of time, may be covered with dirt or grass. So, help us help you by


doing just a small amount of maintenance on the hydrant point outside your property. A few tips to help us:

Please do not:

- Have your designated car parking spot, on top of a hydrant.
- Plant a garden on top of and around a hydrant point (or cover with mulch).
- Stack (or maybe just dump) wood supplies on a hydrant point.
- Make a new entry to your property so that the hydrant point gets buried underneath drive way gravel.

Please ensure:

- Your hydrant cap is free of grown over grass (either whipper snip or apply some weed spray)
- We can access the hydrant easily the more time we take to locate a hydrant that has been covered up, obstructed or buried in dirt – the less time we have to fight a fire at your or your or nearby houses.




Reconnecting with East Gippsland

Andrew Skeoch, one of Australia's best-known wildlife recorders, recently made a return visit to East Gippsland, where among other things he gave a talk at the Bairnsdale Library, before meeting up with an old friend and colleague in Bruthen.

For over thirty years Andrew has travelled the world visiting a wide variety of wild habitats and has published more than a hundred recordings from across most continents. Some of his recordings have featured in a variety of contexts, including a number of feature films such as Philip Noyce's 'Rabbit Proof Fence', the 2016 remake of Disney's 'Jungle Book', and 'Force of Nature' with Eric Bana, released earlier this year.

Andrew first visited East Gippsland in 1994, recording at Errinundra and Rodger River in the Snowy River National Park. This trip resulted in his first CD 'Tall Forest'. In 2017 he returned to join up with Bruthen local Jenny Lawrence, who ran High Country Tours for 32 years. They travelled to Mallacoota and later to the Mitchell River National Park. Here Andrew worked as a facilitator with the tour group, including taking participants on a quiet walk to the Den of Nargun, encouraging and


assisting them to listen deeply and interpret the natural sounds around them.

Prior to his visit to Bairnsdale in November this year, Andrew revisited Waratah Flat in the Snowy River National Park to compare his 1994 recordings of birds, mammals, insects and frogs with the situation after the 2019-20 fires. In this place at least he was heartened to discover the degree of regeneration and an increased diversity of species.

The day after his Library talk, he explored Fairy Dell before heading to Bruthen for a catch-up with Jenny. Andrew's book 'Deep Listening To Nature', published in 2023, invites us to be still and listen, to be open to nature revealing itself and telling us things. He discusses how to identify species by call and interpret their communications ... particularly birds, who negotiate their connections and habitat in such varied and expressive ways. A wonderful aid to help us learn are the links in each chapter to an online soundtrack of more than 300 recordinas.

As Andrew inscribed in my copy of his book ... 'May nature sing to you'.

Citizen Scientists check out our water quality




FOGL (Friends of Gippsland Lakes) President Heather Oke and Catherine van Wilgenburg having fun with the serious business of water testing in the Tambo River at Swan Reach bridge. This is one of the several sites FOGL has selected around the Gippsland Lakes to monitor the pH levels, telling us the rates of acidity and alkalinity in the water over time and throughout the seasons. Optimal pH essential factor in maintaining levels are an



water quality and healthy ecosystems. Accurate pH testing helps keep drinking water and groundwater safe and helps aquatic plants and animals. We will also be testing for salinity, temperature and for phosphorous. Phosphorous is a vital nutrient for plant and animal life within our freshwater ecosystems, but too much can lead to an excessive growth of algae. These "algal blooms" can deplete oxygen within a water body, causing fish kills. Also some algae can produce toxins that can be harmful to humans and animals.

Helen's book launch in Lakes

Growing and Learning in Rural Communities

Dr Helen Sheil, Regional Community Development researcher and former Monash University educator, launched a revised edition of her book 'Growing and Learning in Rural Communities' on November 19 at the Lakes Entrance Library.

Helen has lived in Orbost, Mirboo North, Nowa Nowa, Bairnsdale and is now in Lake Tyers: she has worked in countless community organisations across the region, including in Bruthen.

Her book, first published in 2003, is designed as a manual for organisations, facilitators and managers (paid and unpaid) across a wide range of fields. It details nine strategies to empower community engagement with issues, needs and projects involving diverse groups and viewpoints in small communities, and to shape dialogue between community members and decision makers. The book includes case studies of rural groups that have used these strategies successfully over the past 20 years.

The launch was introduced by Elder Marjorie Thorpe spoke of her work with Aboriginal Reconciliation using study circles. Cr Tom Crook also spoke of the need to work collaboratively with a diverse range of communities and organisations, and the benefits that can be achieved through such an approach.

The launch was very well attended with people representing a wide range of interests and organisations. It was fascinating to see the many personal connections between members of these groups and communities, and there were excellent follow. conversations to Our Rambler representatives caught up with many and had a great chat with Michelle Dowsett, executive officer of the Gippsland Community Foundation, which earlier this year delivered the grant that funded our new

There will therefore be no January edition in 2025, but we will be returning with a new edition on February 5.



Recreation Reserve: Works update & completion of the Community Storage Sheds

The works on the newly erected Community Storage Shed (near the recreation Reserve Cricket Nets), are now complete and will be ready for the various sporting groups to use in the very near future. The Netball Club and Cricket club now have dedicated storage space for their equipment, with the Cricket Club also having space for its pitch roller to be stored. The existing old shared storage shed (for cricket and football), at the rear of the Main Oval dug-outs; will now be for the sole use of the Football Club.

One of the new shed compartments will be used to store tennis equipment and as a temporary store for maintenance equipment.

In addition, it is planned that the old partially completed cinder brick structure will be completed to become the maintenance hut. The Committee of Management also intends to lay a concrete base with a roof extending over the surface to enable allweather protection from the elements. Permanent benches and tables will then be fitted to allow spectators to watch football, cricket, or netball under cover. The new Community Storage sheds can also be used to support emergency response and recovery activities when needed. Many thanks must go to the Gippsland Community Foundation who provided the funds for the sheds to be constructed another example of the key work the foundation has done across the local area. Thank-you from the local community.

The Recreation Reserve Committee has also been fortunate enough to obtain a water station that can be used to refill drink bottles via East Gippsland Water community support. Works on the new change room facilities also continue to progress and are on track to be handed over by the end of December / mid-January. These change rooms will make a great addition to the local facilities and for the first time, offer female sports and umpires/referees up-to-date and modern amenities during







respective sports seasons. Finally, the old gates (once on the concrete pillars at the entrance of the oval) are being repaired and refurbished. These will make a welcome return to the oval and represent part of our history. Watch this space for further announcements regarding the official opening of facilities in the new year.


Thanks



RED-NECKED AVOCET- Bird of the Month December 2024

A regular visitor to East Gippsland and currently found in high numbers in Jones Bay Reserve, is the Red-necked Avocet. These birds live and breed in central Australia but when it's dry they migrate to Victorian coastal wetlands.

A distinctive shorebird with a very long and dramatically up-curved black bill, they appear fragile, slender and elegant. They have a dark red head and neck, narrow white eye ring and a redbrown iris. The primary wing feathers and the small feathers covering the secondaries are black, with remaining plumage being white. Legs are a pale grey-blue. Male and female are similar in colouring and size.

Native to Australia, they are fairly widespread throughout, other than in north and northeast coastal areas of the country. Like many waterbirds, they are highly nomadic due mainly to the high variation in rainfall, moving around the continent in search of suitable habitat. They prefer salt or brackish water and are generally found in shallow wetland areas that are either fresh or salt, or on estuarine mudflats.

Their diet mainly consists of small invertebrates (aquatic insects, their larvae and crustaceans) plus seeds scooped from the shallows by sweeping their slender up-curved bills from side to side through the water surface and underlying mud. Unlike other shore birds, they will swim readily, enabling them to upend like a duck and continue feeding. Juveniles are often limited to small insects and seeds until their bill is more developed, consuming food with a pecking action rather than the water skimming done by adults.

Found mostly in loose colonies during the breeding season of August-November, they generally disperse into smaller flocks for the rest of the year, though sometimes they are found in large congregations. From time to time, it is not uncommon to see over 2,000 birds in Jones Bay.

Pre-mating courtship involves bill-crossing and bowing dances, with the female indicating her readiness to mate by crouching low with wings spread, this usually occurs in shallow water. Each pair defends their nesting territory with a range of displays and postures and will swoop repeatedly at intruders. The nest consists of a shallow scrape that is lined with samphire or similar water vegetation. A single brood is raised per season, with a clutch size of 3–4 eggs, which are arranged in a circle with the pointed ends toward the centre!

Fun Fact 1: The Red-necked Avocet appeared on a 13 cent postage stamp in 1966!

Fun Fact 2: Their call has been described as 'yapping' and flocks in flight make a sound like dogs barking.




"Congratulations to our winners and to all the entrants for so many wonderful entries; each year, I am amazed to see the beauty of our region and the talent of Gippslanders."

Farewell & thank-you to our local Lions

It is with sadness, and a deep sense of respect and gratitude, that we bid farewell to the Bruthen Lions Club, which is in the process of closing down this local chapter of the renowned international service organisation.

The Bruthen Lions Club was chartered 36 years ago in 1988, and true to the Lions' motto 'We Serve' has provided support to the community in many diverse ways throughout that period. Its members have included a wide range of identities from Bruthen and district over the years ... some of whom (but by no means all) can be seen in the attached photos. These photos and more were brought in by Fran Cohn to be stored at Bruthen and District Neighbourhood House, where they will be keenly scrutinised by members of the group 'Bruthen Remembers'.

The current membership was down, however, to seven members: Simon and Fran Cohn, Max Harris, Peter Weeks, Alan Knewstubb and Ingrid and Mark Biram. All of them, like those before, had given so much over the years on top of their commitments to family, work and other needs. At the last meeting they realized they were not able to fill required board positions.

Closure of the Bruthen chapter had in fact been considered for some years, but the fires of 2019-20 drove an urgent need to mobilise the group's skills and resources. A major project undertaken was the East Gippsland Timber Milling Project (EGTMP), a joint venture with Rotary, DEWLP and Lions International which involved milling fallen trees into usable timber for fences, stockyards and more. This service was provided free of charge to fire-affected farmers, and was featured in Tambo Rambler articles in August 2022 and April 2023: these can be accessed online.

With funds from the Lions International Disaster Fund they were able to replace water tanks for properties that had lost theirs in the fires. The Club also operated the Lions Tool Shed in Sarsfield, stocking around 200 items, with everything from shovels to power tools.2

They assisted BlazeAid, providing relief shifts for crew, and hosted members of the Need For Feed runs. In the post-fire period they continued with improvements to the Lions Skate Park, including installing a new toilet block.

There were special treats too, like the kids' trip to Gumbuya Park in December 2022.4 And they continued their long tradition of turning up to just about every community event you could imagine, providing coffee, donuts, food from the BBQ, drinks and raffles.

Now that they are closing down, they have been busy cleaning out their shed, and will be donating trailers, hospitality gear and more to the Lions at Licola. The EGTMP gear was purchased by the Australian Lions Foundation to be available in Victoria for future disaster responses. Remaining club funds will be shared amongst the football, netball and bowls clubs, with whom they have been in a mutually supportive relationship for many years. While we are losing our local team, it is worth noting that there are still many Lions Clubs in East Gippsland that can continue to support the Bruthen and District community.

The Bruthen Lions have been involved in a very diverse and challenging range of projects over the 36 years of their existence, and across the district and beyond we have benefited hugely from the fruits of their labours. We thank them for their dedication, hard work and generosity of spirit.
