The heat was on at the Eat Drink **Explore Bruthen Festival**

A happy crowd enjoyed the beautiful weather in Bruthen Main Street Garden on Saturday, January 18th for the Eat Drink Explore Bruthen food and wine twilight event. Enabled by grants from East Gippsland Shire and the Gippsland Community Foundation totaling \$13,700, the community-run event attracted families and individuals from across the region and further afield. Bruthen Arts and Events Council volunteers had worked hard to create an event that was much more than just a food and wine festival.

All vendors were Gippsland-based and were required to use produce from Gippsland and punters were delighted with the high standard provided. The combination of fine restaurant-quality food, beverages, family activities and arts created an event with something for everyone. The atmosphere created by positioning the dining, live music provided by Elfi, Dan Cawood, Raven and the Dove, Dog Country and IO, and market stalls in the shady Main Street gardens was relaxed and friendly. The weather was perfect as patrons found a seat and settled in for an afternoon eating, drinking and listening to the music. The fun did not stop there with some great kids entertainment at the Mechanics Hall starting with a very funny live show called The Listies, brought to Bruthen by Forge Theatre. This was followed by some children's arty workshops with cup cake decorating seeing the supply of 64 cupcakes disappearing very quickly. The series of 4 SBA cooking demonstrations





food, sour dough gluten free bread and Labneh balls were very popular as was the opportunity to talk to staff from Goodman's Seeds who answered a wide range of topics throughout the evening. Gippsland artists featured in the Sculpture Exhibition with a range of small and large works adding another point of interest. (See Pages 6 & 7). And the Highlight? It had to be the Chilli Eating Competition with entrants required to eat their way through a range of locally grown chillies, starting with mild capsicum and finishing with a very hot chilli but it seems not quite hot enough. One person was eliminated when he returned his chillies into the bucket provided while another walked away leaving five brave people. To get a clear winner a Paper Rocks Scissors competition eliminated two finalists leaving three winners. Organisers agreed that hotter chillies need to be grown for any future Chilli Eating competitions!




Sculpture Exhibition highlights Bruthen artists





Black-Shouldered Kite - Bird of the Month February 2024

Readily seen perched atop a tree, or hovering over grassland with their feet dangling, is the Black-shouldered Kite. A small to medium raptor (bird of prey), they are small mammal specialist, with a love for the introduced House Mouse.

Black-shouldered Kites have predominantly pale grey plumage, with a pure white head, body and tail and black shoulders. They have an orange-red eye, yellow nostrils and yellow legs and feet. The wings are white underneath, with a small black patch on 'wrist joint' of the underwing. Sexes are alike but the female is larger and juveniles have buff-brown feathers on upperparts.

Found throughout mainland Australia where there is suitable habitat, they typically hunt over natural grassland, vineyards or low farmland stubble that has just enough height to harbour mice or other prey. If you take notice, you can often see one along roads or in vacant lands of urban and coastal areas. They are mainly resident but may move in response to the availability of their rodent prey.

Often hunting at daybreak and dusk, they will work in pairs or alone. They ride on the wind and hover skilfully while using their sharp eyesight to spot prey from afar, then the wings move through a wide arc and they divebomb at the opportune moment. While they are normally silent hunters, they will occasionally let out a short, high-pitched whistle during the breeding season when communicating with their mate. While their main prey is small rodents, they will also eat large insects like grasshoppers, as well as other small mammals, reptiles and birds.

They can breed throughout the year with a peak during spring and autumn and may have two broods a year when food is abundant. They form monogamous pairs cemented through elaborate aerial courtship displays, which involve the male offering the female food in mid-air. For a brief moment they are locked together, each gripping the same prey with their feet as they hover. Their nest is a platform of sticks lined with green leaves, bark or fur, typically well hidden in dense leaves in the top half of a tall tree. The nest is built by the female with the male sometimes helping to gather material. The female incubates while the male either guards from

a nearby tree or hunts and passes over prey caught. Young fledge from the nest at about 35 days old.

Getting to know the Red Gum Plains

We live in a pretty special part of the world. Victoria is split into 28 Bioregions, and the Red Gum Plains landscape is within the Gippsland Plain Bioregion. This bioregion spans from Traralgon in the West, to Lakes Entrance in the East. The Red Gum Plains

landscape comprises around 325,000 ha, where 7% is public land, and 20% has native vegetation cover. The Victorian Government's Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act 1988 (FFG) lists this area as Forest Red Gum Grassy Woodland Community, while the Federal Government's Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act1999 (EPBC) lists the area as Gippsland Red Gum Grassy Woodland and associated native grassland, as well as Seasonal Herbaceous Wetlands of the Temperate Lowland Plains. Whichever name you call it, this ecological community is listed as critically endangered under the EPBC Act.

So, how do you know the bush you are standing in is the Red Gum Plains? Well, to make it a little more confusing there are two forms of this ecological community; a grassland form, and a woodland form. Obviously, if there are few trees, and mostly grasses and herbs, you are standing in a grassland form, and if there are trees, then you are standing in the woodland form. The grasses and herbs are mostly the same for both forms which makes it that little bit easier! You need to be able to identify some of the plant species within the area. A good plant identification book comes in handy.

As the name suggests, the dominant tree species is the Gippsland Red Gum, or Forest Red Gum (Eucalyptustereticornis subsp. mediana). Other tree species may also be present, along with the Gippsland Red Gum. These may include Drooping Sheoak, Black Sheoak, Apple-Topped Box, Coast Grey Box, But But, White Stringybark, Yellow Box, Snow Gum, Red Box, Candlebark, and Manna Gum.

The ground layer is dominated by a suite of perennial grasses, sedges, herbs and wildflowers (Lillies and daisies) which can be seen flowering mostly in Spring. Species may include: Creeping Bossiaea, Common Rice-flower, Chocolate-Lily, Kidney-Weed, Slender Bottle Daisy, Small St John's Wort, Sprawling Bluebell, Thatch Saw-Sedge, to name a few.

Shrubs are not a significant feature of this ecological community and account for less than 5 to 10% of the overall cover. Species may include: Lightwood, Black Wattle, Blackwood, and Burgan.

There are Flora species that are listed as nationally threatened under the EPBC Act. Some of these are: Matted Flax Lily, Purple Glycine, Dwarf Kerrawang, Swamp Everlasting, Metallic Sun-orchid. And, there are others listed as endangered under the FFG Act. These are: Fisch's Greenhood, Orange-tip Finger-Orchid, Coast Grey Box, Bushy Hedgehog-Grass, Spurred Helmet-Orchid, Forest Red-Box, Dwarf Kerrawang, Fringed Helmet-Orchid, Leafy Greenhood, and Purple Diuris.

There are many fauna species that rely on this ecological community for food, shelter, and for

nesting. There is a number of species listed as nationally threatened under the EPBC Act. Some of these are: Swift Parrot, Growling GrassFrog, Green and Golden Bell Frog, Southern Brown Bandicoot. The White Bellied Sea Eagle, Eastern Great Egret, Musk Duck, Blue Billed Duck, Southern Toadlet, Eagle, White-throated Needletail, Lace Little Monitor, Powerful Owl, are listed as Threatened or Vulnerable under the FFG Act. Also, the Black Falcon, Barking Owl, Swift Parrot, are listed as critically endangered under the FFG Act. The main threats to this ecological community as listed include: vegetation clearing, consequent fragmentation of native vegetation remnants, invasion by weeds and feral animals, inappropriate management regimes (grazing, mowing or fire), tree dieback and timber harvesting, and firewood collection. And, now we can add mining to the list.

Ye Old Opp Shop helps out rural communities



Bruthen's Opp Shop has been around for a long time, servicing the local community and further afield.

The Shop was built by the Anglican Church to raise funds for the Diocese, to pay for the upkeep of three churches (Swan Reach, Buchan, as well as Bruthen) and to fund the services of a Minister.

It serves as a place for people to donate unwanted articles, in good condition, as well as somewhere to shop for good quality used clothing, kitchen items, toys, books, CDs, DVDs and linen.

The list goes on. We also have a shed full of furniture.

Recently the shop has been working with remote area Op Shops, sending requested clothes in a prepaid bag from Australia Post which holds 5 kg. Generous people have paid for these bags, \$25. Thank you.

The shop is staffed by volunteers who as well as serving customers have a big job out the back going through all the donations.

The shop has been transformed in recent weeks, with streamlined coat hangers, more models, and clothes racks. Much easier for customers to find that special dress.

We often have sales.

We also provide car sale businesses with rags for car cleaning, using a machine to tear up pieces of sheets into equal sizes.

There is also a lot of work involved in finding ethical sources to take our "move on" items which are not good enough to sell but can be recycled.

It's a happy fun place to shop. Going to a theme party? We have the dress for you. Men's clothes too!

And it's fun to work there, interacting with travelers who call in and locals alike.

New volunteers are always welcomed to give it a go.
