

Bruthen remembers ANZAC Day 2025



ANZAC Day rolled around in 2025, and this year a crowd of over 120 assembled in the Main Street Gardens at the Cenotaph at 5:50 am to participate in the Bruthen Dawn Service ANZAC Day Commemoration.

This was a true country and community event with participation by the two local schools local volunteers to assist with proceedings. commemoration began with a music reflection to set the scene and allow any late stragglers to arrive for the main ceremony. Proceedings commenced with a reading of the Modified Requiem by Alan Jones who saw service in Timor Leste' and the Solomons. James Nicholas provided a brief speech on the key events that occurred at ANZAC and what they mean to us all as Australians. Of special note were the sacrifices of that generation, where across Australia nearly one in four soldiers, sailors or airmen did not return to their families, instead lying in the fields where they fell. Sue Smith (former Royal Australian Navy), then read the Ode which is the 4th stanza of the poem For the Fallen by Laurence Binyon.

An important part of the commemoration was participation by local Primary Schools. This year Lylah Cerda from Tambo Upper Primary School had the honour of flag duties and Jack Bittner from Bruthen Primary read perfectly "The Oath"; which is a declaration of respect and gratitude for ADF members and their families. The Last Post was sounded by Angela McStephen who made the trip up from Melbourne to be with us once again. The service concluded with prayers from Chaplain Brian from our local St Matts Church.

Sunrise just started to shine its rays as the service concluded, where an informal "gunfire" breakfast was enjoyed by those assembled. Thank-you to all who participated.

The wonders of the Land Bridge to Tasmania

Gippslanders were recently treated to a free screening of the fascinating documentary 'The Land Bridge' at the Forge Theatre in Bairnsdale.

This powerful film by Wind & Sky Productions takes us back 40,000 years and more to the last ice age when sea levels were lower, and mainland Australia and Lutruwita/Tasmania were joined by a vast grassy plain.

It has been suggested that the term "Land Bridge" is

something of a misnomer, for this was a very extensive plain, as the maps on the web site show.

This Bassian Plain now lies some 60 metres below Bass Strait, whose islands and coastal places were once the hilltops and mountains of this ancient and now submerged landscape.

The film explores this landscape, its peoples and cultures, and its animals and plants through the perspectives of marine scientists, cultural custodians, paleoecologists and wildlife biologists. It hiahliahts the enduring connection of Gunaikurnai, Palawa and Bunurong peoples with this world, and the ongoing collaboration between their custodians and multi-disciplinary research teams.

Following the screening there was an on-stage panel discussion (see attached photo) led by producer Lucinda Horrocks, with a very actively engaged audience.

Police Brief



Bird of the Month: Tawny Frogmouth

Frogmouths are mid-sized Tawny nocturnal predatory birds. They are quite widespread in low numbers though they can be quite difficult to see. Although they can look a lot like owls, they are readily distinguishable by their broad gape and flattened bill, their long-graduated tail and distinctive forehead tufts.

"Is it a bird or is it a branch?" Alarmed frogmouths often adopt a 'broken stick' posture in which the body is aligned along a branch, the head and bristles angled upwards, eyes closed to slits, mimicking an extension of the tree branch. The sighting of a perching Tawny Frogmouth delights those who notice the well camouflaged bird (or birds). When threatened they may hiss loudly and strike a defensive pose with eyes and beak wide open, however for Tawny Frogmouths, disguise is the best form of defence. The grey mottled plumage resembles bark and is effective camouflage as they rest quietly in tree canopies during the daytime, or perch stiffly at night from a low perch or fence post watching and listening for prey. They hunt by a 'perch and pounce' strategy, on a targeted and silent flight to ground level to catch large insects, spiders, frogs, small mammals and ground birds which they capture and handle with their strong bill, not with their relatively weak legs and feet.

Tawny Frogmouths are found right across Australia, with geographic and individual variation in size and plumage. The subspecies found in the south and east of Australia is the largest. Sedentary birds, they are frequently sighted in treed habitats with access to open areas and cleared ground, perched stockstill in pairs or family groups by day; at night they are likely to be hunting singly. They can be found in urban environments that provide adequate treed areas, water and food sources, but are less likely to be encountered in deserts, rainforests and wet dense eucalypt forests.

The call of the Tawny Frogmouth is a low, resonant, rapid "ooo-oom-oom-omm" or the male "ar-oom, aroom, aroom-aroom". Breeding season is August to December, after rains in more arid regions. The nest is an untidy, loosely constructed platform of large sticks lined with leaves, usually located in a tree fork or the broken end of a branch 2-15m high up. They form monogamous pairs and share the incubating, feeding and care roles. The male

incubates by day and the female by night, over a period of 30 days. After the chicks have hatched, the whole family may be seen roosting together. The young are ready to leave the nest at about four weeks of age.

Birdlife East Gippsland welcomes visitors and newcomers.

Birdlife East Gippsland meets weekly from 9am to 12pm on Mondays, including a tea break. New members and visitors are always welcome. The annual schedule of outings across the region ensures diverse locations and interesting bird observing. The records collected are submitted to the national database.

BYO refreshments & water; wear appropriate clothing, boots and sun protection. Binoculars are handy. Planned

Hootie & The Blowfish's Let Her Cry finished the set. Sue opened with a gospel like blues song Trouble Will Find You then Carole King's You've Got A

Finishing with an old classic Man's Been Laid Off For Trouble completed her strong and sustained set. Waz opened with Bob Dylan's Girl From The North Country

Old favourite Cowgirl In The Sand by Neil Young pleased the crowd.

Tom Waits I Hope I Don't Fall In Love rounded it off perfectly.

Poet Moss read the poem which mentioned Michael and Tambo Honey.

Then a nostalgic ode to a bike in the Bairnsdale Tip Shop. His poem about 50 years of a life together brought tears to eyes, and has been published in an American literary magazine.

Dave finished the afternoon lineup singing J.J. Cale's Cocaine with accompanying sax - first class!

Then an old blues standard with backing tracks of honkytonk piano and drums.

Another classic blues Key To The Highway. All the performers then got up for a big jam at the end to perform Knocking on Heaven's Door, Dave's soaring sax really made it something special. Followed by Come Together then Let It Be. Just Kye and Jaz sang Wicked Game unplugged.

Then Jaz on her own finished up the proceedings with Nothing Else Matters by Metallica, Aerosmith's Dream On then the Beatle's Blackbird. Driving In My Car by Tracy Chapman completed her impromptu set.

Altogether it was a very satisfying afternoon of interesting and accomplished performances. I recommend and encourage everyone to check it out on the last Sunday of each month. **PB**
