# **Medieval Winter Fire Festival report**

Bruthen's Medieval Winter Fire Festival (MWFF) grew from a conversation with the East Gippsland Historical Re-Enactment Society (EGHRS) four years ago. The partnership developed into the popular festival that people love. Attendees loved the opportunity to dress for the Middle Ages, enjoy a good bonfire, see some great fire acts, sword fights, experience medieval crafts, games and graze from some of the region's best food and beverage trucks. The Festival has grown into the most popular event in the East Gippsland Winter Festival.

The number of people invading Bruthen for the MWFF has grown each year with over 2000 people from all over the state and interstate attending this year. They had to brave a very cold and frosty night which followed the beautiful sunny winter's day. The happy crowd was made up of all ages from tiny babies to grandparents in their eighties.

The Arts and Events members and their team of volunteers had once again worked their magic with the entire area decorated with colourful flags, drapes, quirky decorations, shields and Tiki lights. The hall interior was dressed with velvet drapes,

sensuous materials and fairy lights creating a pretty mixture of medieval and modern.

It is hard to pick a standout highlight because there was so much to see and do and it was all good. The clever and amazing costumes, the lighting of the bonfire with a beautifully made metal dragon by local sculptor Jon Whitfield, the sword fights and combat demonstrations by EGHRS and Ashen Circle, Ryan Pedley's fire act to Viking-inspired music, flaming weapon fight demonstrations by EGHRS, and great music from WRioT and Dog Country made it an event to remember. For many it was a chance to catch up with friends, old and new. Thank you to East Gippsland Shire and a CRC-LGA grant, Tambo Waste, Kennards Hire and Smith Creative (photography) for making this Bruthen event possible.



# **Winter Festival Fires Up**

The fifth annual East Gippsland Winter Festival kicked off over the Winter Solstice weekend with an incredible lineup of events, big crowds, perfect sunny days, and roaring fires. There was a sense of excitement across East Gippsland as the monthlong festival got underway. From icy plunges and winter feasts, to fire shows and medieval pageantry, the opening weekend set the tone for what promises to be the festival's biggest and most vibrant year vet.

The Official Opening event at Sodafish in Lakes Entrance on Friday evening celebrated five years of region-wide collaboration and community spirit with festival sponsors, artists, organisers and media partners. The 2025 Festival was officially declared open by East Gippsland Shire Council Mayor John White in front of 120 stakeholders and supporters including representatives from Visit Victoria and Destination Gippsland.

Guests were treated to the best regional produce and locally caught wild seafood in a menu created by Sodafish's renowned chef Nick Mahlook, and beverages from festival sponsors Lightfoot Wines, Sailors Grave Brewing and Logans Micro-Distillery. Meanwhile, the Boatshed in Lakes Entrance kicked off the Program of 100+ events across the region with a Food and Winemakers Night, while up in the High Country, Omeo hosted a Winter Solstice Eve Yoga Session.

The annual Gippsland Jersey Winter Solstice Sunrise Swim made an exhilarating splash on Saturday morning, with hundreds of daring participants braving the VERY chilly morning, leaping into Cunninghame Arm in Lakes Entrance to promote positive mental health. Participants enjoyed free chai afterwards around the fire pits at the refurbished Lakes Entrance Slipway.

Saturday afternoon saw the return of an annual favourite - the Bruthen Medieval Fire Festival, bigger and better than ever with over 2,000 people in attendance. The large crowds enjoyed another perfect winter evening as they rugged up in Medieval costume to enjoy thrilling sword fights, bonfires, fire displays, lively music, Morris dancers and fireside feasting with over 20 food and drink stalls on offer

The fun didn't stop there with Winter Solstice soirees and gala balls, live music performances, yoga at the Nicholson River Winery, bike rides, sourdough making workshops, winter markets, paddling progressive lunches, a scarecrow making workshop, and so much more across the opening weekend.

Worried you've missed out? Don't be! There is still plenty left to run with over 100 unique events to enjoy across the month-long winter festival program. Running right across the School Holidays until the 20th of July, it's one of the largest and most diverse



winter festival programs in Australia. With plenty of free family-friendly events, the East Gippsland Winter Festival caters for all ages, interests and budgets.

Founder, Adam Bloem was elated by the success of the opening weekend and what is shaping up to be his fifth and favourite festival yet:

"We couldn't have asked for a better opening weekend! The sun was shining, people were smiling and there was a real buzz in the air. The Gippsland Jersey Winter Solstice Swim was definitely a highlight with around 300 people taking the plunge. There was a wonderful sense of community connection and it just keeps getting bigger and better each year. Well done to Sallie Jones and her team."

"We were blown away by the Bruthen Medieval Fire Festival once again. Attendance continues to grow each year and the Bruthen Arts & Events Council volunteers out-do themselves every year. The thousands of visitors that attended the opening weekend will have provided a great boost to local businesses with many of the attendees coming from outside the East Gippsland Shire. We encourage you to come and experience 'How We Winter' in East Gippsland." Adam added.

# The skills of the past on show

The East Gippsland Historical Re-enactment Society was a critical part of the success of Bruthen's Medieval Festival, and what a skilled and dedicated bunch of people they are. While its members share a common interest in exploring and re-enacting a range of aspects of historical life, they also bring an incredible diversity of talents and experience to the group. Much of this was on display at the Hall during the Festival, in addition to the combat skills and equipment so effectively demonstrated in the paddock outside.

Group members engaged an eager public in a range of demonstrations and chats, as the photos show. It was quite an experience for a kid to try on some armour (a typical chainmail shirt can weigh between 15-20 kilograms ... some of those on display were made by group members).

People were also fascinated by the painting on display, done by Lara Telehin. This was inspired by an illustration in the Maciejowski Bible, also known as the Morgan Picture Bible or Crusader Bible, dating to the first half of the 13<sup>th</sup> century.

Secretary Tom Seville is pictured here working on shoe-making, but he also works on a range of other explained that members practise crafts. He numerous crafts, including varied forms metalwork, spinning, weaving, dyeing, needlework, woodwork, cookery, herbalism, tanning, archery, pottery, music, games ... and the list goes on.

The group organises workshops to teach a range of skills and work on projects. It meets for regular training sessions every Sunday at 10 a.m. (except for the fourth Sunday of each month) at Roderick Pavilion, Howitt Park, Bairnsdale. On the fourth Sunday its members meet for crafting purposes at someone's home.

The group welcomes like-minded people with an interest in history to come and watch or make contact and join up. Check out their Facebook page to find out more.

And thank you again to all their members for their great contribution to the success of the Festival.






# **Knowing Where** We're Going: The Power of **Learning Goals**


In classrooms across the school, you'll see students talking about their learning goals, checking their work against success criteria, and using feedback to guide their next steps. These simple strategies build confidence, independence, and a strong sense of purpose.



Anchor charts are an invaluable tool for our Foundation students. These colourful, visual aids are created with the students and help to make abstract learning goals and success criteria clearer and more accessible. Not only are anchor charts helpful in supporting student understanding, but they also foster a sense of ownership and collaboration in the classroom.



In Grades 3 to 6, students actively use learning goals and success criteria to monitor their progress. Throughout a sequence of lessons, they engage in regular self-reflection, using the success criteria to assess their growth and identify next steps. They gather evidence of learning to reflect on and evaluate their understanding.



Understanding what they are learning and how to succeed is just as important in our specialist subjects as it is in the classroom. Recently, our Grade 3 and 4 students took time to reflect on their learning goals for the semester. This process helped them connect more deeply with their progress, recognize their strengths, and identify areas for growth. By setting clear goals, students are not only more engaged but also better equipped to take ownership of their learning journey.



# **Bruthen topples ladder leaders**

The Bruthen Senior Footballers had much to celebrate last Saturday, toppling the ladder leaders Swan Reach on their home deck in a hard fought five point win.

After a dominating start to the season, the senior boys were dealt a footballing reality check and lost their premiership favouritism after consecutive losses to Omeo-Benambra & Swan Reach in Rounds Four and Five, followed more recently by two consecutive close losses to Buchan & Omeo-Benambra in Rounds Eight and Nine.

Whilst missing some key players through injury, the Senior boys are working hard to rediscover their best football and apply it for four quarters of effort.

Last Saturday's win was a positive step towards rediscovering their best footy, which was on display in many moments throughout the game. It also built belief within the team that they are capable of winning the close games after two narrow losses.

Sitting Third on the ladder (a game behind each of the Top Two) and with the best percentage in the league after Round 10, the senior footballers are gearing up for a strong run home, seeking a Top Two finish and a home qualifying final if they can remain on the winners list.

With 2025 being one of the closest ODFL competitions in recent memory, any team from 5th onwards can stake their claim at finals, so the Dogs will have to remain ahead of the trailing teams whilst also taking a few scalps from the teams placed above late in the season to secure a Top Two finish.

The Under 16's football are developing well throughout the season, with a very youthful and undersized team, with plenty of growth from players new and old on display throughout the season. With three wins under their belt so far and sitting in fifth position, the Juniors will be looking to take the lessons learnt so far this season to secure a few more wins to gain a spot in the finals. The positives are not reflected in the win/loss column, but more so in the great development seen across the board in a young team.

The A-Grade netballers are sitting Third on the ladder with a five win and five loss ledger at this point in the season.

After a couple of heavy losses in the previous two games, they will be seeking to get back on the winners list with a crucial third vs fourth game against Lindenow South this weekend.

B-Grade netballers premiership defence is looking shaky, with a four win and six loss start to the season. After seemingly being out of the game against Swan Reach in Round 10, the girls mounted a strong comeback in the second half, only to fall an agonising four points short. With a tough game against third-placed Lindenow South who the B-Graders are yet to register a win in 2025 against, this match proves a crucial game for staying in touch with their premiership defence in 2025.

U/17 Netball have continued in their premiership defence with a lot of new faces in 2025, currently sitting second on the ladder having only dropped two games, both to ladder leader Swan Reach. The U/17 girls will be looking to continue their winning form and get back on the winners list after a 38:21 defeat last weekend.

U/12 Netballers are developing well, having secured two wins so far this season, and again with many individual improvements on display throughout the team.

With most Bruthen Football Netball Teams in contention for finals, it proves to be a very interesting run home for the Club in 2025 across the board.

You can't miss this piece of work on the CFA Water Tank in Tambo Upper, where Stephenson Road converges with Duncan Road just before the bridge over the Rail Trail. # **Bird of the Month: Azure Kingfisher**

Azure Kingfishers are small, colourful 'perch-and-pounce' predators. They are a distinctive waterside kingfisher with striking blue upperparts and orange-rufous underparts, a long strong black bill, red feet and a short squat tail. Males and females are similar in appearance.

Elusive birds, they are commonly found along well-vegetated rivers and creeks and shaded areas beside lakes, dams and wetlands. They patrol the waterways from perch to perch, flying low and fast above the water sometimes with a high-pitched 'pee-ee pee-ee' whistle as they plunge-dive headfirst for fish and other swimming prey. It can be hard to spot a shy Azure Kingfisher perched quietly in shady overhanging foliage until they suddenly plunge for prey, making a splash before returning with their catch, often bashing it against the perch before swallowing it headfirst. It is always an exciting moment for birdwatchers when they spot an Azure Kingfisher, and if they are lucky, to photograph the colourful spectacle.


Azure Kingfishers are found across northern and eastern Australia. They are widespread east of the Great Dividing Range to the Victorian border and south into Victoria and Tasmania. Breeding season is from September to January with monogamous pairs defending their breeding territory. They build their nest in a burrow dug into a riverbank and both parents incubate and feed the chicks.

Degraded natural environments present challenges to Azure Kingfisher habitat. For example, stock trampling vegetation around waterways reduces perch sites and muddies the water; human activities that cause artificial flooding can drown nests; European Carp competing for food can adversely affect local populations.
