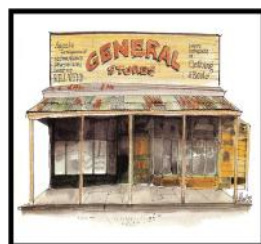
Raf shared his enthusiasm and commitment to servicing and being part of rural communities, drawing on his early life growing up in a small rural village in Egypt where the local pharmacy was a crucial link to accessible health services and information. Growing up with this firsthand

experience of the importance of a local pharmacy as a contact point for primary health information and advice had a significant influence on Raf and his siblings who were all drawn to education and careers in health professions. His brother is an Eye Surgeon, and his sister is also a pharmacist. Raf began his professional career in Egypt where pharmacy education includes traditional approaches to medicines alongside modern pharmaceutical methodology. In Australia Raf has worked in rural settings in outback QLD and regional Victoria as

well as in metropolitan pharmacy settings. "I love working in rural areas servicing peoples' health needs and have a lifelong commitment to remote and regional community health, developing relationships with clients and community networks" Raf told the Rambler team. Bruthen Pharmacy is registered under Rural Pharmacies Pty. Ltd and has 'sister pharmacies' in Metung and Coleraine.

Raf notes that local pharmacists are well-placed to work closely with individuals as a 'last point of contact' before clients commence their medication regime, with the pharmacist always alert for discrepancies, errors and potential risks such as drug interactions or polypharmacy. The Bruthen Pharmacy liaises closely with prescribing doctors and medical clinics, including Gippsland Lakes Complete Health which provides limited GP and nursing services in Bruthen two mornings a week.

Raf encourages people to approach him at Bruthen Pharmacy to discuss their medication questions or concerns regardless of where the medications have been dispensed from. He is committed to engaging with the local community as a key contact for accessible and professional health advocacy and advice offered with professional confidentiality and privacy assured.

The range of products and services offered at Bruthen Pharmacy include:

- An instant prescription service.
- Webster Pak packing and dispensing service.

- Free Blood Pressure and diabetes checks.
- Agent for Diabetes Australia.
- Professional personalised advice on medications.

Preserved Lemons (Makes about 1 Litre)

You will need:

- 4-6 lemons (Myer or Eureka work well)
- 4-5 additional lemons for juice
- 60g coarse sea salt (do not use table salt or iodised salt which is too bitter)

Method:

- Scrub the lemons for preserving and dry them off.
- Cut the lemons into quarters, place them in a shallow bowl and cover the cut surfaces with salt, about 1Tbsp for each quartered lemon.
- Cover with a weighted plate to help release the juices, leave for about 30 minutes.
- Pack the salted lemons into a sterilised jar, squeezing them in as tightly as possible.
- Add optional extras according to preference. For example 2-3 bay leaves, some peppercorns, a cinnamon stick, coriander seeds.
- With the quartered salted lemons squeezed tightly into the jar, pour on the juice of the extra lemons to cover the lemons completely.
- Seal the jar and leave overnight in a cool place but not in refrigerator.
- Check the next day, pressing the lemon quarters down to ensure they are submerged. If needed, add lemon juice to cover.
- After 4 weeks they will be ready to use.
- Store in refrigerator where they will keep for about 6 months.

Using Preserved Lemons:

To use, remove lemon quarters from the liquid and rinse to remove excess salt. Scrape out the pulp and slice the lemon peel into thin strips or dice finely. Mix with sauteed vegetables, soups, and tagine dishes to add a distinctive salty flavour. Diced preserved lemons can also be mashed with butter and fresh herbs to serve with grilled fish.

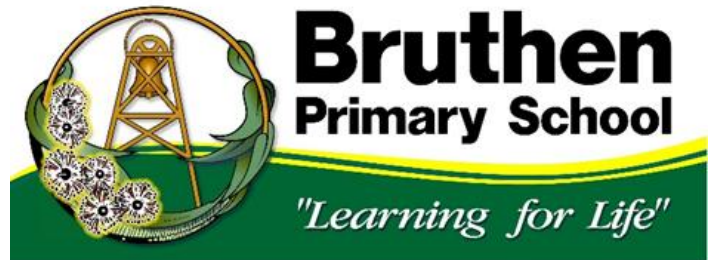
Bruthen Primary Students Shine at District Athletics Carnival

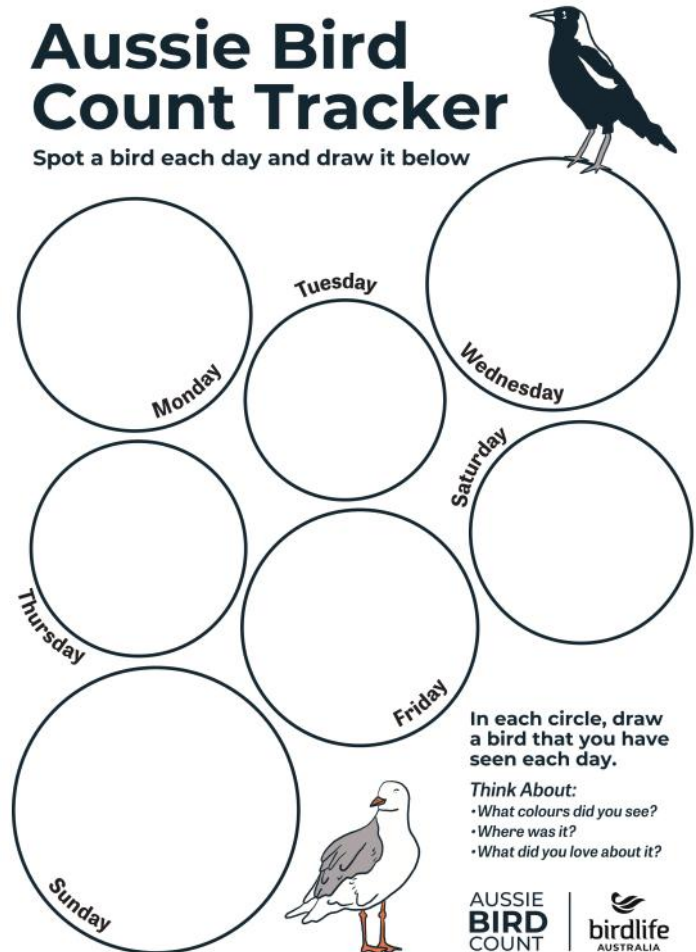

Bird of the Month: Powerful Owl

The Powerful Owl is native to South-eastern and Eastern Australia along the coastal fringes and hinterland. Habitat is typically wet eucalypt forests and some dry forests and urbanised areas where there is adequate prey. For example, a powerful owl was present for years at the La Trobe St. Metro Station in Melbourne, feeding on the brushtail possum population in the surrounding small park.

It is the largest of Australia's owls with a relatively small head and a long-rounded tail. The eyes are yellow-orange set in a dark grey/brown facial disc which is less distinct than some owl species, sometimes described as 'hawk-like'. The sexes look alike though the female is smaller and has a narrower head. Juvenile birds are downy white on the head and underparts, with a much shorter tail than the adults. The legs are feathered with massive yellow-orange feet with very sharp talons. The owls roost by day in large shady trees. Sometimes a roosting owl will have the previous night's prey held in its strong talons. Prey includes mid-sized mammals like possums, flying foxes and gliders, and large birds like magpies and cockatoos.

The Powerful Owl territorial call is a loud, slow, penetrating double hoot (*Whoo-hoo*) with a ringing, musical quality, most notable in Autumn and Winter during breeding season. The male owl has a deeper voice than the female while the begging calls of juvenile owls are a thin, shrill trilling.

Powerful Owls are long-lived, territorial and monogamous, defending their territory throughout the year. They breed in winter when the male prepares the nest, usually in a vertical hollow in a large old tree. The male provides food for the female and young during the early nesting period. The female incubates the eggs and broods the young, emerging later in the nesting period to hunt for food as well. Young birds remain with the parents for several months after fledging and may stay within their parents' territory for over a year.

The conservation status of Powerful Owls in Victoria is listed as 'vulnerable'. Threats include habitat loss and degradation from logging and land-clearing impacting access to nesting hollows and food sources. Reduced protective cover also increases the vulnerability of young birds to introduced predators like foxes and cats. They are sensitive to

human disturbance, particularly during breeding season, with negative impacts on breeding success. Human intrusion may be benign but can be harmful if the owls are disrupted or distressed by activities such as photography, shining torches and noise. Secondary poisoning occurs if owls eat prey like rats and mice that have ingested poison baits. Vehicles also pose a threat with owls killed or injured while hunting around roadsides. If you are aware of Powerful Owls sharing your environment, be mindful of their habitat needs, ecosystem safety and nocturnal activity including around roadways.

B Grade's premiership defence also came to an end, as they were edged out of the top four by Buchan.

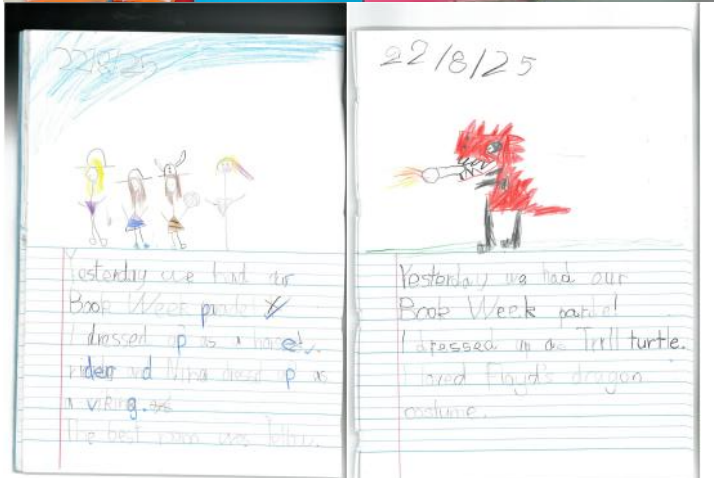
The Under 12s missed their final match of the season but can be proud of the progress they made throughout the year.
