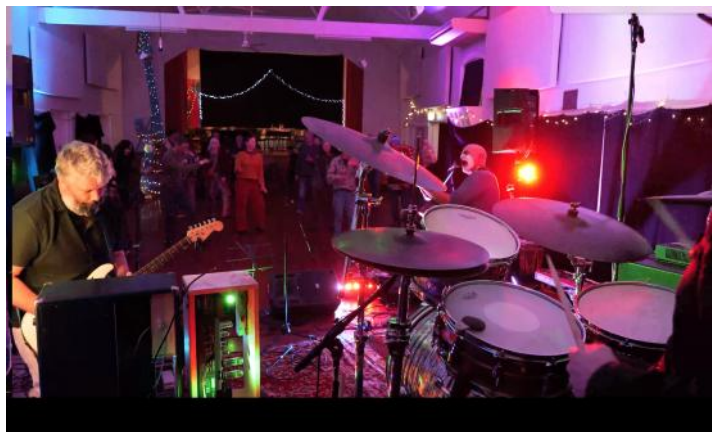

Spotlight on the Lineup

Forest firefighters help protect Victorian communities

Applications are now open for seasonal and ongoing forest firefighter roles across Victoria.

Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) is recruiting entry-level forest firefighter positions across Victoria for the upcoming bushfire season. Both ongoing and seasonal roles are available.

FFMVic Chief Fire Officer, Chris Hardman, said seasonal firefighters boost Victoria's firefighting capacity in the lead-up to summer and during the peak fire season.

"New recruits train and work alongside our permanent firefighters, responding to bushfires to keep communities safer this summer," Mr Hardman said.

"They will be part of a team of close to 1800 frontline personnel and 1200 accredited incident management staff this bushfire season."

"These are fantastic jobs doing practical work, right



at the frontline of protecting communities and the environment."

FFMVic firefighters responded to more than 900 bushfires across the state last summer and delivered priority planned burns which will help reduce the impact of future bushfires.

Mr Hardman said seasonal firefighter roles provide rewarding career opportunities for those with a passion for the outdoors, learning new skills and making a difference.

"In addition to responding to bushfires and helping to deliver planned burns, seasonal firefighters also undertake pest and weed control works, and maintain recreational reserves, fuel breaks and forest roads," he said.

"We want a diverse pool of people applying for our jobs. We want our crews to reflect the communities they serve and to have a range of skills and experiences."

"Most importantly, we're looking for recruits with a 'can do' attitude who can work as part of a team."

Some roles are designated for First Nations employment.

Applications for the 2026-2027 season have now closed and the recruitment process has started, but they are still accepting supplementary applications that may be considered in areas where additional candidates are required. 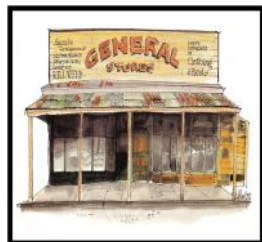

Putting locals first in Bruthen

Local post offices are the lifeblood of country communities, and Bruthen Post Office is a perfect example.

It was great to visit the Bruthen Licensed Post Office and catch up with licensee Kelsey Schueler, who understands just how important this service is to the local community.

The Bruthen Post Office has been operating since 1893 and continues to provide essential services for local residents, farmers, small businesses and visitors.

It is more than a place to collect parcels or send letters. For many locals, it is where they do their banking, pay bills, access important services and catch up with a friendly face.

In small towns like Bruthen, these services matter. They keep people connected, support local businesses and make sure residents are not forced to travel long distances for basic services.

Sadly, Licensed Post Office operators across the country are facing changes that are making it harder to keep their businesses viable.

Australia Post has been progressively reducing the range of products and services licensed operators are permitted to offer. That means fewer reasons for people to come through the door, less foot traffic, and greater pressure on the future of local post offices.

A leaked Australia Post document obtained by the Coalition has revealed plans that could see Licensed Post Offices stripped of core services, consolidated into other retail businesses, or reduced to parcel-only outlets.



Of particular concern is that the program could begin with "last service" post offices in communities with no nearby financial institutions, meaning rural and remote towns could be among the first affected. In response, the Coalition has moved quickly to establish a Senate Inquiry into Australia Post's management of, and plans for, its retail network. Submissions are now open and close on August 7. I am encouraging Gippslanders to share their concerns about the importance of postal services in our communities.

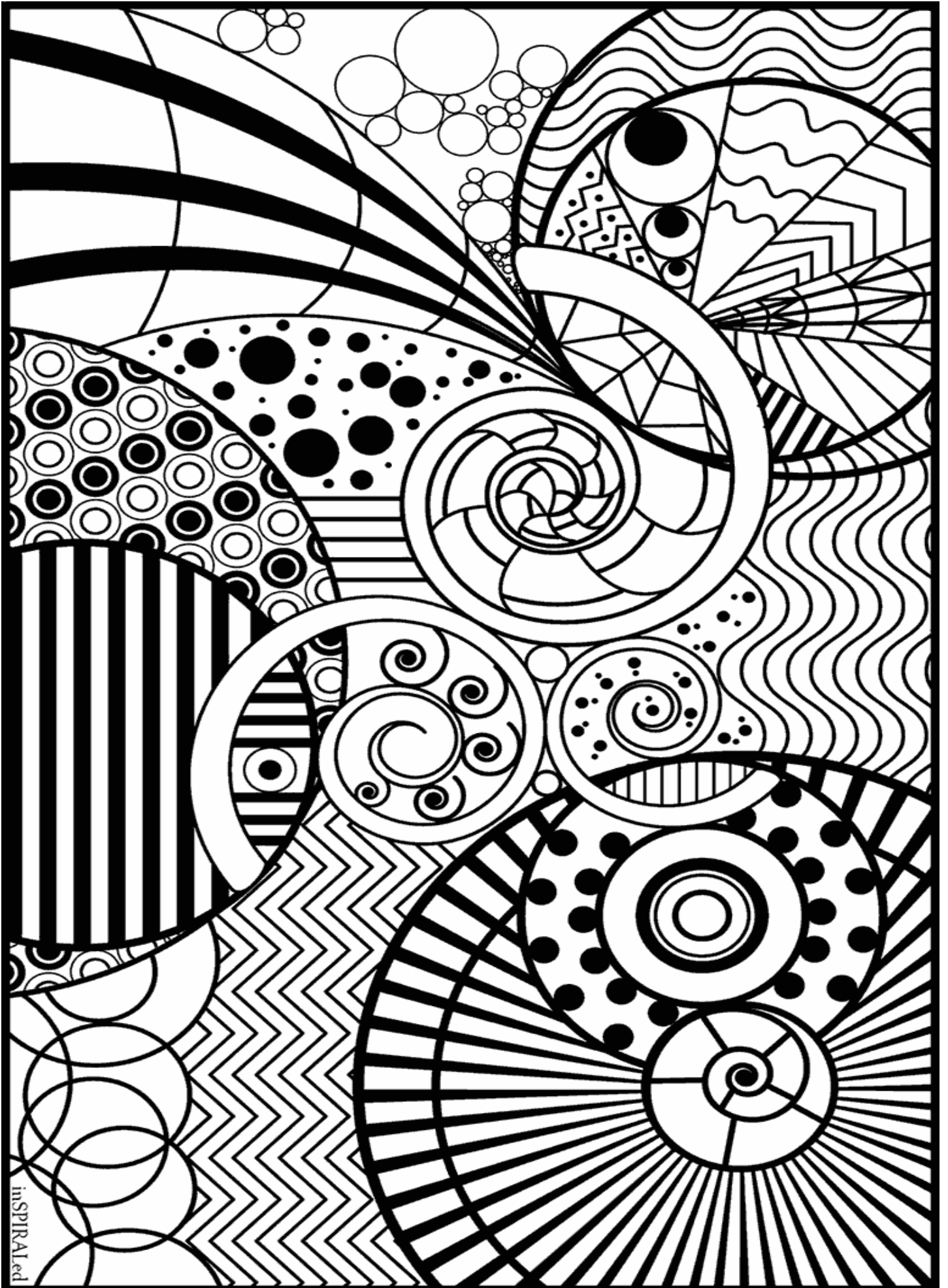

Bird of the Month: Eastern Rosella

Rosellas are a distinctive group of medium-sized parrots with a long, broad, graduated tail, large cheek patches and clear scalloping on the mantle and back. Rosellas have a varied diet of seeds, flowers, buds, berries, fruits and insect larvae. They feed in trees, shrubs and on the ground. The Eastern Rosellas use one foot, usually the right foot, to hold food when eating.

The Eastern Rosella is found throughout south-eastern Australia, from QLD to Victoria, SE South Australia and eastern Tasmania; and is a familiar sight locally in East Gippsland. Eastern Rosellas are predominantly bright red, yellow and blue with conspicuous white cheek patches. They are smaller and more finely built than Crimson Rosellas which are commonly seen sharing habitat. They are a familiar sight in lightly treed country, woodlands, grasslands, forest edges, parks and gardens. The two species have similar calls, but the Eastern Rosella has a higher pitched, rapid and melodic sound. Conspicuous groups of noisy, active rosellas draw attention though they are somewhat wary and take flight when disturbed. The Eastern Rosella's flight is strong with rapid wing beats interspersed with short undulating glides.

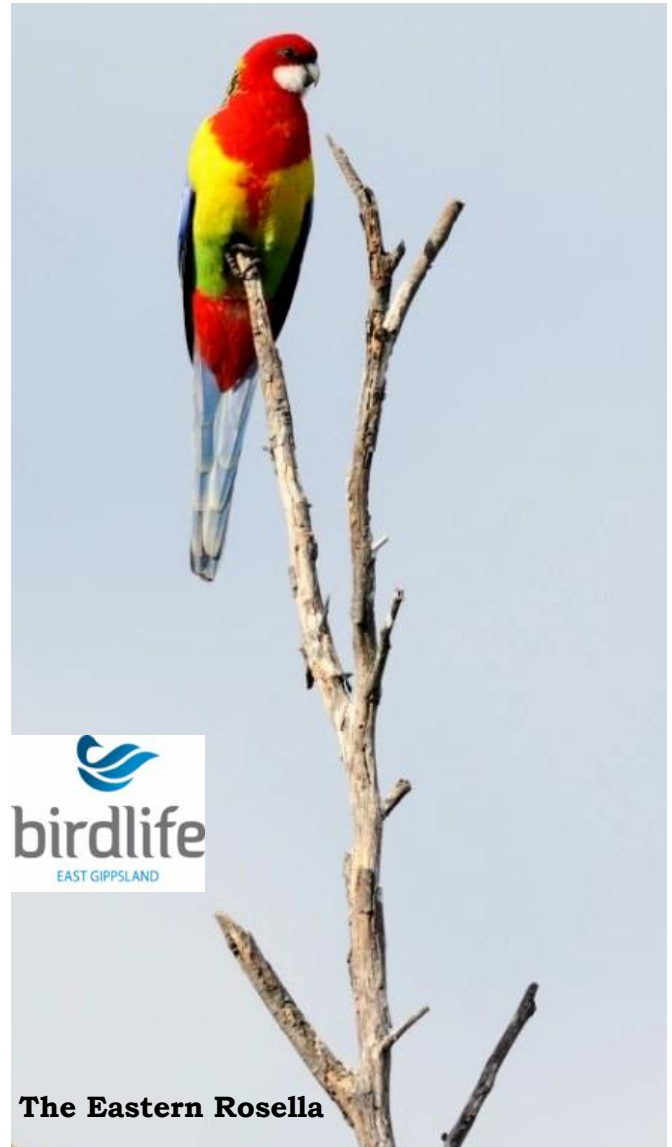
Eastern Rosellas mate for life. Breeding season is August – February. The female chooses the nest site, usually a hollow in a eucalypt tree though sometimes they will use an artificial site like a nesting box. Four to eight eggs are laid on a decayed wood bed with the female incubating the eggs while the male visits regularly to feed his brooding mate. The young may be fed for a while after fledging.

While the conservation status of the Eastern Rosella is listed as of 'Least Concern', they face a range of threats including habitat loss due to land clearing for agriculture and mining, competition for nest sites by introduced birds such as starlings, and predation by domestic pets.

Rosellas may be considered pests by fruit and crop farmers and may be subject to large scale trapping, sometimes linked to the aviculture trade.
